1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The college is situated in the vicinity of 3 closer cotton mills, several closed oil mills and mills of pulses. The most part of the college is surrounded by slum and habitat of down trodden and first-generation learners. The catchment area of the college is countryside of BarshiTahsil in Solapur district. Most of the students come to the college by walk or bicycle or by bus. As the students have to do the part time work because of their financial condition. Basically,college was started in 1969 to cater the need of subaltern class. The children of milk workers were educated in this college. The educated migrated for jobs and works in different parts of the country. Because of the closing of the mills the families wereforced into destitution. Again, they are forced into working class, farmer class,economically affected class and needy class. In the course of time the institution has paced up in terms of the necessity of time and the stake holders. We have started job oriented professional courses like BCA and BBA. We also have started back hoe loader training, X-Ray machine operator training, tally training centre purely on non-profit basis to make the students self-employed, job givers and employed through Loknete Bhausaheb Charitable Training Centre. The institution has been doing a noble work for the development of the common man.

The college is a multi-faculty, co-educationinstitution. Two programs are aided by the Government of Maharashtra and two programs are self-financed. College has 2f and 12B status

Curricular Aspects

Institution has its own unique work culture. There has been 3 tier system CDC, IQAC, departments/committees. The top management believes in decentralization of the powers, responsibility and duties. The CDC formed according to Maharashtra University Act 2016 takes the decision in wide perspective. Every decision is taken carefully and actions are planned minutely and executed smartly. The timely follow up and action taken reports are seriously treated. The timely meetings and proper planning right in the beginning of every academic year is reflective of quality consciousness of the top management. The decisions of the CDC are worked out in IQAC and executed accordingly. The process of decentralizing the powers and communicating the decisions of the top management to the concern heads, conveners and coordinators and bringing them on the mission mode is the basic objective of the working culture of IQAC. The former Principal of this college Mr. S.C Dhuttargaon was MA Mathematics. The BA Geography student enrolled for M.Sc. in Geography. c) The University offers CBSE pattern in different courses, different kinds of surveys, visits & projects are conducted for the sake of community engagement and for the holistic and multidisciplinary development of the student. d) The institution is a multi-faculty co-education one. The institution insists on the optimal use of infrastructure and resources. So the Science program is run in two shifts and students would get the opportunities of multidisciplinary study and already we have completed ABC registration also. e) Already the faculty members have multidisciplinary research and receive funds from different agencies. f) The institution has research guides and they have enrolled to them multidisciplinary research project.</p>
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	<p>a) Initiative taken by the college in Student Registration for ABC. b) The Percentage of Students Register Under ABC : 69% c) The institution is an affiliated college to Punyashlok Ahilyadevi Holkar Solapur University, Solapur (PAHSUS), strictly follows rules, regulations, statutes ordinances, Government resolutions and UGC Guideline. Still the college has signed 21 MoU's, in last 5 years. d) As mentioned earlier the institution is an affiliated college. The syllabus is designed by the University. However, the faculty members are representative on university board of studies. They are the Chairman's of BoS, Members, Chairmen and members on BoS sub-committee. Apart from that there is certificate, Add-on and Value added courses designed by the different departments in the college. The faculty members design courses, design syllabus, prepare notes and reading materials. The teachers have</p>

They prepare their assignments and assess the papers. e) The institution has a good mechanism of maintaining connectivity with students through Mentor-Mentee System, so the mentors convince and register the students on ABC. Skill development:</p>	<p>a) The institution has constituted LOKNETE BHAUSAHEB CHARITABLE TRAINING CENTER for offering skill based and Vocational Education, presently the center runs four courses related to Physical, Financial and Paramedical field viz. JCB trainer, Operator, Tally, X-Ray technician. X-Ray is affiliated to PAHSU, Solapur. Tally is affiliated to Tally India. JCB Operator and Mechanics are affiliated to Infrastructure and Equipment India.</p> <p>b) The institution has Minimum Competency Vocational Courses (MCVC) under which there are Dairy technology, Electrical and Motor rewinding and Electronics, as well as the institution runs BCA and BBA as degree courses affiliated to PAHSU, Solapur. The institution had conducted a number of Skill Courses and 80 certificate programs in last 5 years to promotes Vocational Education. c) For nurturing humanistic, ethical, constitutional and universal human values. The institution organizes curriculum based classroom activities, value based courses, extension and outreach activities in the college vicinity and community. There had been different value added course in the last Five years. Two of these courses are conventional and the medium of instruction is Indian language (Marathi). The medium of answer writing for the courses in humanity is Marathi. So the lectures are delivered in Marathi. The Hindi language is used for the students of Hindi course. The college also have Sanskrit department. Indian languages are emphasized in communication. The department of Hindi significantly contributed to the research and translation. The institution is associated with Sahitya Academy. Dr. G.R.Kashid is on jury on Sahitya Academy. Dr. G.R.Kashid and Dr. S.K.Nainwad have valuable contribution for Hindi to Marathi and vice-versa translation. Dr.M.B.Gadekar Department of English, has his Ph.D. dissertation on English-Marathi translation as well as he has research paper on Marathi translation. b) It has been a part of practice that department of English uses bilingual (English and Marathi). c) BA courses are introduced in Marathi except English, Hindi and Sanskrit. B.Sc., BA, BCA introduce the content in English and Marathi. d) i) College has preserved Sanskrit Department and there have been program on encouragement and guidance on Pali language. ii) The department of Physical Education has Yoga Studies as an interdisciplinary subject. The college has Philosophy, Sociology, Sanskrit, Hindi, Marathi, etc. language departments. They have prime focus on Indian traditional knowledge like folk literature. Dr. M.B.Gadekar has his M.Phil. dissertation on Myths, Fables and Parables in the Novels of Githa Hariharan, an Indian Novelist. iii) Through cultural department, NSS, NCC and other departments organized cultural activities in which Indian Art forms are presented. 1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The institute was established in 1969 by Late Shriman Bhausaheb Zadbuke for the welfare of poor, needy and down-trodden. The college is a multi-faculty, co-education, undergraduate, grant-in-aid institution affiliated to Punyashlok Ahilyadevi Holkar Solapur University, Solapur (PAHSUS). It is regulated by UGC, Maharashtra Government and PAHSUS. As per Maharashtra Public University Act 2016 (Mah. Act No. VI of 2017) published in the "Maharashtra Government Gazette" on 11th January 2017, Chapter IX, Section 97, the institution has constituted College Development Committee (CDC). The CDC prepares overall comprehensive development plan of the college regarding academic, administrative, and infrastructural growth.

Planning, Implementation, Follow up, Reports and Action Taken Report Mechanism

CDC

At the end of every academic year, CDC reviews the performances and plans for next academic year. In the beginning of the academic year, CDC conducts meeting and prepares calendar, constitutes committees (viz. Admission, Timetable, Examinations, mentor-mentee etc.), determines the policies regarding curricular planning, delivery of content, evaluation, feedback and action taken report. The same are communicated to the IQAC to implement.

IQAC

The IQAC meets four times in an academic year. In the beginning of the academic year, the policies determined by the CDC are discussed for implementation and decisions are made. The HODs regularly conduct meetings to implement the decisions. The concerned heads take the reviews of work and prepare report and communicate these reports to IQAC. The IQAC conducts meeting at the end of first term and takes the review of all departments and committees. It also reviews all decisions followed successfully. It also reviews that the departments are functioning according to academic calendar. Whether the curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities are completed in time. The concerned head, committee coordinators take the follow-up and keep the records and communicate it to the concerned. At the end of every term it is communicated to the IQAC.

Departments/Committees

According to the decisions made in IQAC, the Heads and Convener conduct the meetings to prepare academic calendar, prepare a time table and allot the workload, Internal Examination, prepare activities for cross-cultural issues, plan Tours/Trips/Visits/Surveys, Field Projects, Multimedia etc. The heads of the departments monitor the entire process of maintaining Teacher Diary. Head has the direct control on entire

procedure of teaching learning and evaluation of a particular department. Everyday a teacher has to put the teaching plan of the day before the head.

Faculty

Every individual teacher has to prepare his annual teaching plan program wise. It is necessary to get it approved from the Head and Principal periodically. As well the teacher has to prepare teaching plan every day. An individual faculty member has to prepare his presentations, create multimedia and present them for the students. The teachers are at Liberty to plan and implement as per their convenience and maintain the records with them which is kept with the department. The teachers have used variety of tools techniques and methodologies for the implementation proper content delivery and various information and technology tools for internal evaluation.

Mechanism of Internal /External Assessment

The college is affiliated to the university, so the entire process of Assessment and Evaluation is conducted by the university. However, the college conducts internal examinations continuously, systematically and transparently. It is prevalent in the departments like English to use innovative and ICT based evaluation systems. There have been the use of OMR Scanning, Online Testing, Activity-based Testing and other methods which are more individualised and specific reflecting the reliability, validity and transparency. The college has its own Grievance Redressal Cell, but apart from it, the IQAC monitors Internal Evaluation Committee through which the internal exams are conducted at regular interval for monitoring the progress of the students. Policy of IQAC

Every year IQAC constitutes examination committee. The entire responsibility of conducting internal examinations is shouldered over to the concerned committee. It is the responsibility of the committee to redress the examination related grievances in time and communicate the same to the students. The grievances regarding the university examination are collected at the examination window and communicated to the university. The redressal is communicated to the students.

Examination Committee

The examination committee constituted by Internal Quality Assurance Cell conducts the meeting at regular interval and schedules the internal examination communicates the same to all the stakeholders. The entire responsibility of conducting the examination and declaring the results is on the committee.

Examination Process

The examination committee prepares academic calendar, declares the schedules of internal examination, communicates the schedule to the concerned. The concerned heads of the department have the responsibility to set question papers and submit to the examination committee. The Examination Committee has the responsibility to manage the entire printing process and conducting the examination with the help of all the teacher and non-teaching staff. The concerned teachers have to assess the answer sheets and submit the results to the examination committee. The examination committee declares the results. The results are kept with the department as well as examination committee. The students are given their assessed answer sheets for the sake of improvement. The queries of the students are satisfied by the subject teacher and head. If the problem persists, it is addressed to the head of the examination committee. The examination committee redresses the problem.

Reporting Mechanism

Every year, the examination committee has to submit the report of entire process of conducting examination to the IQAC. The IQAC in the final meeting discusses all reports.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

The external audits also done by the institution periodically. The funds issued by the state government is audited by the **Joint Director Solapur, Senior Auditor Solapur**. The Grants received from **PAHSU, Solapur** are audited by the University. And at regular interval the **Auditor General Mumbai (AG Bombay)** audits all the audited reports.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

All the possibilities of students centric, content based, vision and Mission oriented introduction of the course content is decided in the IQAC. It is minutely observed that the planning has been made meticulously and implemented effectively through direct and indirect interaction with the concerned the heads and teachers. Through the maintaining process, time table committee, heads of the departments, different related committees like examination the processes are monitored and reviewed by IQAC at a regular interval. The syllabus completion reports at the end of terms and feedback at the end of the academic year are indicators to visualise the incremental growth.
